- Let the Department leadership know where they can assist the Detachment
- In short, act as the liaison between the Detachment and the Department, assisting in any area that you may need help with.

BUSINESS MEETING MAY 8th

Rex Delk: Last year at this time we had 1128 members. This year its 1201

Judge Advocate - If your detachment turned in bylaws but has not had them signed and approved it is because your signature page needs to be fixed or signed.

VSO - New Vet Tec 2.0 program. Electronic training is available during the month of June through the VA. The program is just now rolling out. It is a \$60 million program. *(More information in mission essentials section of the newsletter)*

The average cost of an ER visit is between \$1500 and \$3000. If you go to the ER, you have 72 hours to check in with the VA. They may or may not cover costs. The number to notify them is (844)724-7842. Make sure your family knows in case you aren't able to contact them yourself.

Try to call Ronnie on Tuesday or Thursday. He is currently booked 2-3 weeks out. Good things are happening in the VA – claims are being processed quicker now. Ronnie checks his cases every day. Be patient!

Newsletter - Send newsletter items to Candie at newsletter@mcldeptofga.org. Candie asks that detachments please participate, post on their Facebook. This is free advertising for your detachment. The public can see what you're doing and where donations are going. If you send something, it will go in minus photo infractions, political content, or crude content. J. Baker urged detachments to do a newsletter.

Web Sgt - We have transitioned to a new host. We are in the process of getting emails moved. Google Workspace allows for 1:1 meetings to be set up without having to go through the SVC. Ed stated that even if he is not at home, he still has his laptop and is still working. Lots of changes are coming but the purpose of the changes is to make things easier. Finally, if you have any great ideas you want to share, type them up and send them to Ed to put on the website.

Young Marines - Someone is needed in the Marietta area to head up a Young Marines unit. If you can't start a unit, then support one. Uniforms cost between \$275 and \$300. Money donated through the department will be used for all state units.

Getzie Lamar spoke about the closing of the Metro Atlanta Unit. With no leader, the members were absorbed by her unit which has relocated to Hiram and has tripled in size. They attend Vet Fairs to recruit. One is coming up in Columbus. The Regiment support officer wants to double the number of units. Units are being considered in Columbus, Athens and Unicoi. She is available to do a "Start a Unit" presentation for your detachment. Getzie also has a newsletter "Attention On Deck" for her unit. She gave us information on her next graduating class of recruits. The graduation will be at Liberty Plaza on May 29. A limited number of tickets are available.

Compliance Officer - Georgia was the first of seven states in SE Division to be fully compliant. Bob Borka sent out an email with detachments and departments that were not compliant. The Department of Georgia wasn't on the list nor were any Georgia detachments. Remember that IRS, SoS need to be done – all detachments are currently done except 1260. R. Broussard stated that "Georgia is pristine" when it comes to compliance and offered congratulations. If you have questions about compliance, see the board.

Convention - Detachment 1311 is looking to host next year, the third weekend in May. More info coming.

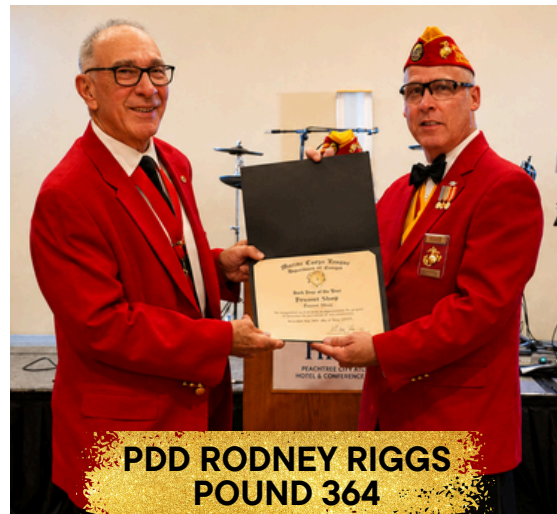

The problem? If no one sees it, they may never know it's happening. That's where social media, especially Facebook comes in.



Why Facebook Matters

Think of Facebook as your Detachment's digital front porch. It's often the first place people go to learn who you are and what

you do. When you regularly post photos, updates, and stories, you're not just sharing information, you're inviting people in. You're showing them the faces behind the mission, the moments that matter, and the difference you're making in real time. And here's the thing, people connect with people, not just causes. A quick post about a volunteer going above and beyond, a snapshot from a community event, or even a behind-the-scenes look at a meeting can go a long way. These small glimpses build a bigger picture and help others feel like they're part of something meaningful.

Social media also builds trust without you even realizing it. When your page is active and engaging, it shows that your Detachment is alive, involved, and making things happen. That matters to potential members, donors, and supporters. They want to know their time, energy, or money is going somewhere that's active and making an impact.

Even better, Facebook helps spread your message further than you could on your own. One post can be shared, commented on, and seen by people far outside your immediate circle. It's like word-of-mouth, but faster and with a much wider reach. The best part is that it doesn't have to be perfect. It just has to be real. A simple photo and a few sentences about what you're doing is enough. Consistency matters more than polish.

At the end of the day, if your Detachment is out there doing great things, don't keep it a secret. Share it. Celebrate it. Let people see it. Because the more people who know about your Detachment, the Marine Corps League and our mission, the more people you can inspire to be part of it.



- Assign a social media person/team
- If you are new to FB, start with trying to post at least once a week (event, meeting reminder) then boost up to 3x.
- If you post daily, limit to 2 posts a day.
- Use visuals, photo, infographics and videos
- Sharing is caring but DO NOT rely solely on shared content.
- When sharing DO NOT "empty" share. That means share without adding commentary. The FB algorithm prioritizes shares WITH commentary.
- DO NOT post a bunch of posts/shares consecutively.
- TAG the Dept Facebook page!!!

BEWARE OF SCAMMERS!

Scammers use apps, AI, and fake email addresses to trick you into thinking you are getting calls, texts, or emails from legitimate businesses or government agencies. Always disconnect the call if someone you don't know is requesting your personal or account information. Always double-check before communicating any type of personal identifiable information (PII).

Warning signs in texts, emails, or calls:

- Suspicious sender address
- Poor grammar and typos
- Links or attachments
- Urgent or threatening language
- Requests for sensitive info – passwords/pins
- Pressure to stay engaged on the call
- Unexpected requests for urgent payments

What to do:

- Stop and think, talk to someone
- Don't click the link
- Disconnect. Do not respond to texts with suspicious links.
- Verify business or agency information

Don't be fooled or take the bait. Disconnect, double-check, and stop scammers in their tracks! Learn more about spoofing fraud and reporting resources at [FBI.gov](https://www.fbi.gov).

BLAIRSVILLE, GEORGIA ...

THE ROCKPILE

Khe Sanh, Da Nang, Dong Ha, Saigon, these are just a few names of landmarks commonly associated with the Vietnam War. On Monday, March 30th, members of MCL Unicoi Detachment 783 gathered and held a dedication ceremony for a tribute to the Marine Corps' 9th Marine Regiment who defended The Rockpile from 1966 to 1969.

Also known as Elliot Combat Base, The Rockpile is a solitary jagged karst rock located 10 miles south of the former Vietnamese Demilitarized Zone. It was recognized for its strategic importance early on. At 790-feet tall the monolithic formation gave a commanding view of the area and served as both an artillery base and as a vital observation post. Located at the juncture of five major valleys, U.S. troops could monitor the North Vietnamese Army movements to and from the DMZ.



Duty on The Rockpile was generally considered to be safe, compared to other more exposed positions in the DMZ. Climbing the formation was nearly impossible and left those who might attempt it literally exposed. The only reasonable access was by helicopter. The top of the Rockpile is about 40 feet long and 17 feet at its widest point. With the exception of a makeshift helipad, there were no flat surfaces to be found at the top making daily life uncomfortable.

During the late 1960's the 9th Marine Regiment played a vital role in keeping Elliott secure by conducting numerous operations around The Rockpile. The regiment's commitment, courage and determination during this time were decisive factors in successful operations such as Operation Hastings and Operation Prairie in 1966, Operation Buffalo in 1967 and Operation Pegasus in 1968.

The Rockpile tribute was spearheaded by Detachment 783 member LtCol. Roger Pilcher, U.S.M.C. RET. A captain at the time, the retired Marine describes his exposure to The Rockpile as being one of only a few minutes at a time. Everything had to be flown in and out via chopper, including men, supplies and any administrative needs. It was Pilcher's job to take care of the needs of all the 1st MAW Marines at Chu Lai, Quang Tri, Da Nang and Khe Sanh as well as all civilian employees. This duty included The Rockpile. According to the retired LtCol., "Choppers would occasionally break down due to the vertical climb, but thanks to the 9th Marines, we never lost one that I was aware of". Pilcher accredits this to men like Detachment 783's Commandant John Entwisle, who served as a grunt with a weapons platoon, in I Company, 9th Marines in 1967 and 1968. Part of I Company's responsibilities were to defend the base of the mountain and to patrol Route 9 near the DMZ. The result was numerous firefights and artillery duels.

According to Pilcher, "I was not a hero and though I was always armed, I never fired a face to face shot with the NVA. On my last day in country, I escorted some burn cases out of Khe Sanh where Marines had been hit by incendiaries. Those were the real heroes. It was my privilege to construct a small tribute to those Marines". After the conclusion of the ceremony, MCL members and guests alike placed rocks upon the tribute in remembrance of those who defended The Rockpile, including those who gave the last full measure

For a Marine Corps League Honor Guard, properly folding the American flag is a solemn act of respect and tradition. Each fold must be done with precision, reflecting the dignity owed to those who have served. Regular practice ensures that members perform flawlessly during ceremonies and funerals, where families and fellow veterans expect the highest level of professionalism. There is no room for error in these meaningful moments. Practicing together also builds teamwork, discipline, and attention to detail. Most importantly, it shows a deep commitment to honoring the flag and all it represents.

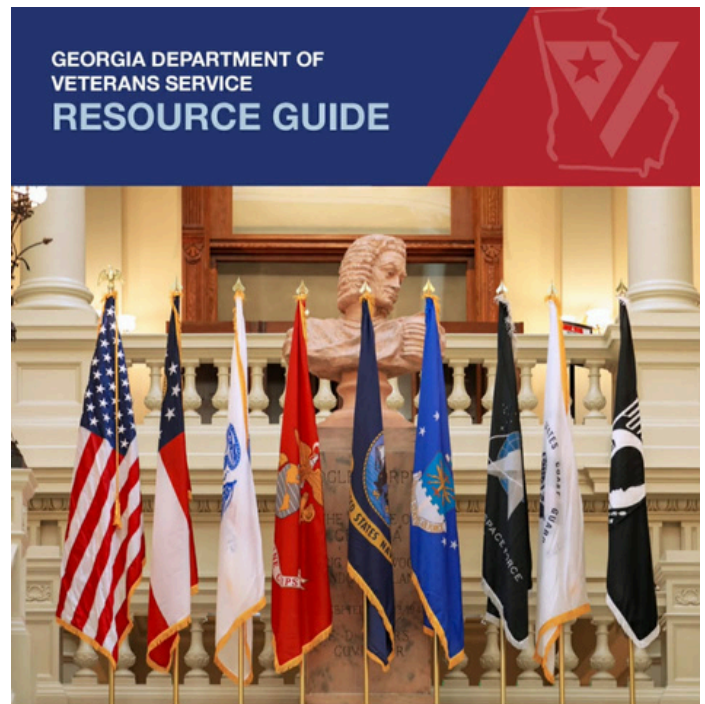

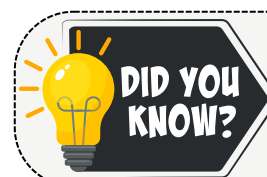

Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses 2.0 (VET TEC 2.0) is a program that helps eligible Veterans and active-duty service members develop skills to start or advance their career in a high-tech industry such as Computer programming, Computer software, Data processing, Information sciences and Media application.

Am I eligible for VET TEC 2.0?

You may be eligible if you meet the requirements listed here.

1 of these must be true:

You're a Veteran discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, or

You're an active-duty service member who's within 180 days of separating from service

And you must meet both of these requirements:

You served at least 36 months on active duty, and

You're under 62 years old when we approve your application

Note: This program is limited to 4,000 paid participants in a fiscal year, but Congress may change the number of participants at any time.

THIS MONTH IN USMC HISTORY

2 May 1946: Marines from Treasure Island Marine Barracks, under the command of Warrant Officer Charles L. Buckner, aided in suppressing the three-day prison riot at Alcatraz Penitentiary in San Francisco Bay. WO Buckner, a veteran of the Bougainville and Guam campaigns, ably led his force of Marines without suffering a single casualty.

5 May 1983: In Beirut, Lebanon, a UH-1N helicopter carrying the commander of the American peace-keeping force, Colonel James Mead, was hit by machine gun fire. The six Marines aboard escaped injury. Colonel Mead and his crew had taken off in the helicopter to investigate artillery and rocket duels between rival Syrian-backed Druze Moslem militiamen and Christian Phalangists that endangered French members of the multinational force.

8 May 1995: In the wake of the most devastating storm to hit the New Orleans area in more than 200 years, a group of Marines and sailors from Marine Forces Reserve demonstrated the quick response synonymous with the Navy/Marine Corps team. Within 24 hours of being called, Marines assisted in the evacuation of 2,500 civilians, and Navy corpsmen treated scores of flood victims.

10 May 1945: The 22nd Marines, 6th Marine Division, executed a pre-dawn attack south across the Asa River Estuary and seized a bridgehead from which to continue the attack toward Naha, the capital of Okinawa.

15 May 1862: Corporal John Mackie, the first Marine to earn the Medal of Honor, was commended for service in the USS GALENA during action against Confederate shore batteries at Drewry's Bluff which blocked the James River approaches to Richmond.

16 May 1945: The 22nd and 29th Marines continued the attack against Half Moon Hill, a day characterized by the 6th Marine Division as the "bitterest" of the Okinawa campaign. By the 18th, the famed "Shuri line" had been breached.

22 May 1912: First Lieutenant Alfred A. Cunningham, the first Marine officer to be assigned to "duty in connection with aviation" by Major General Commandant William P. Biddle, reported for aviation training at the Naval Aviation Camp at Annapolis, Maryland, and Marine aviation had its official beginning.

23 May 1988: The V-22 Osprey, the world's first production tilt-rotor aircraft, made its debut during rollout ceremonies at Bell Helicopter Textron's Arlington, Texas, facility. More than 1,000 representatives from the military, industry, and media, gathered to hear various speakers, including Gen Alfred Gray, Commandant of the Marine Corps, praise the versatile rotor craft designed to meet the needs of 21st Century battlefields.

26 May 1969: Operation Pipestone Canyon began when the 1st Battalion, 26th Marines and 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines began sweeps in the Dodge City/Go Noi areas southwest of Da Nang. It terminated at the end of June with 610 enemy killed in action at a cost of 34 Marines killed.

29 May 1991: Elements of a joint task force that included the 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade departed the Bay of Bengal off the coast of Bangladesh after nearly two weeks of disaster relief operations following a devastating cyclone. The joint task force delivered tons of relief supplies using helicopters, C-130s, and landing craft in Operation Sea Angel.
